Dear Town Board Members,

We live on Lyellton Drive in the town of Clayton and we are writing to you with great concern for what is happening with the two homes on either side of us.

We purchased our summer home in 2007. The home to the left of us has been a seasonal rental for as long as we have lived here. We have no problem with that except for the fact that the owners take very poor care of the exterior and the grounds. This year they decided to make it an **Airbnb** and have had daily to weekly rentals this season. This basically turned this cottage into a motel. There were many different families and groups of people staying there and it is quite disconcerting not know who will be living next to us day to day. We have no way of knowing who these people are or if they will be good neighbors or not. Does **Airbnb** do a background check on their renters? Our homes are only 20 feet apart and their lot is only 50 feet wide so this makes these homes kind of intimate.

Our neighbor to the right of us has been a seasonal rental for the past two years with the same couple occupying it. They have been great. The owner informed them they would not be allowed to rent the property next year because they will be going the daily rental way. The owner told them that there was much more money to be made that way. So here we are with 'motels' on either side of us. They have turned these residential properties on a quiet dead-end street into commercial properties. When we bought our home we bought into a residential neighborhood and had no intention of living in a commercial zone. Several of our neighbors voiced similar concerns about the number of strangers coming into the neighborhood on a temporary basis.

We realize that **Airbnb** has rules that renters have to follow and the home to the left of us has a 'no dogs' rule but the second group that rented there for a week were two families that each had a dog. The owners didn't check or didn't care and being growled at was quite annoying. Do we have to police these properties? We are both in our 70's and do not need this kind of anxiety.

We could not find any town code regulating this practice so we are asking you to put yourselves in our shoes and see how you would feel if your home was in the same situation?

As we said earlier we have no problem with seasonal rentals. This **Airbnb** practice is strictly driven by the almighty dollar where the owner makes out and the neighbors suffer for it.

These are seasonal homes that were never meant to be 'motels'. There now needs to be town code that protects homeowners like us from this kind of intrusion. We are asking you to address this issue before next year's season.
